Did You Know?

In Florida, white families make up the largest number (1,075,800) of the 2.8 million families living in poverty **according to the U.S. Census**. But black families (655,600) and Hispanic families (912,000) have higher rates of poverty proportional to their population.

Generally, no. The Act's definition of homelessness centers on the student's living arrangement. There are no specific income limits in the definition. Income is vaguely referenced in the context of children and youth "sharing the housing of others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason." Therefore, in determining whether shared housing meets the Act's definition, it may be appropriate to consider the family or youth's financial resources. However, there are circumstances in which relatively affluent families may be considered homeless under the Act, such as women and children fleeing domestic violence.
